We do this by collaborating with individuals and community groups, to improve outcomes across health, education, and financial stability for people of all ages. ## Financial Stability

"We are really struggling lately, some days my husband and I dont eat tea so that our kids do." - anonymous pantry user

For United Way Glenelg FINANCIAL STABILITY means having access to education, job training, financial tools, and essentials like secure housing and food, helping individuals manage everyday needs and work toward a more secure future. 23.5% of households are living on a low income and many experiencing rental stress. Glenelg Shire's SEIFA score sits below the regional Victorian average, highlighting pockets of significant disadvantage—particularly in Heywood and parts of Portland. Food insecurity is a growing issue, with 11.3% of adults definitely worrying about running out of money to buy food in the past year.

The impact of these socio-economic factors means that a growing number of people across Glenelg Shire are struggling to afford basic necessities. For many, the choice may come down to paying a bill or buying food—highlighting the importance of targeted support services, local investment, and strong community partnerships to improve long-term wellbeing.









#### Creating Access Where It's Needed Most

United Way Glenelg is helping ease financial pressure for local families through practical support like the Little FREE Pantry network.

These pantries offer free, accessible food in neighbourhoods across the Shire, making a difference for people doing it tough.

Many users are turning to the pantries for the first time, often without access to other food relief services.

The pantries provide a quiet, stigma-free way to get support when it's most needed. Feedback from the community reminds us just how vital this service is—with some families relying on the pantry so their children don't go without.

By filling gaps and responding to real needs, United Way Glenelg is helping more people get through hard times with dignity.

#### Practical Support for Vulnerable People

The Salvation Army's Captain Sal Regional Support Vehicle plays a vital role in supporting the financial and emotional wellbeing of some of our community's most vulnerable individuals.

Operating outside the Portland courthouse and in surrounding areas, Captain Sal provides warmth, comfort, and practical support to people navigating difficult circumstances—many of whom are facing legal, financial, or housing challenges.

By offering a safe space, connection to services, and a moment of calm, the service helps reduce stress and improve outcomes for those doing it tough.

This initiative aligns with United Way Glenelg's commitment to creating pathways to financial stability by ensuring no one is left behind during times of crisis.

## Education

For United Way Glenelg, EDUCATION is about creating opportunities for people of all ages to gain the skills, knowledge, and support they need to reach their goals and build brighter futures.

In the Glenelg Shire, education levels are lower than the regional Victorian average, with only 34.7% of residents completing Year 12 and just 19% holding a diploma or higher qualification. Many people face barriers to further education—including financial pressure, limited local access, or the need to join the workforce early—leading to cycles of disadvantage that can be difficult to break.

The impact of lower educational attainment extends beyond employment, influencing health outcomes, confidence, and long-term financial stability. Lifelong learning plays a crucial role in building resilience, yet many in our community miss out on these opportunities.

Strengthening pathways to education from early childhood through to adulthood is vital to creating a more inclusive, skilled, and empowered Glenelg Shire.











A major milestone was reached as we celebrated the delivery of its 50,000th book through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library— an initiative that continues to shape brighter futures for children.

To commemorate the occasion, an interactive mural featuring butterfly wings made from book spines was installed on the Hurd Street side of the old tuck shop, capturing the imagination of the community and inviting families to celebrate their reading journeys.

Inspired by Dolly Parton's love of butterflies, the mural symbolises the magic of storytelling and the transformative impact of early literacy.

This achievement reflects the strength of community partnerships, with support from Portland Aluminium, Gardiner Foundation, and many local donors, all working together to nurture a love of reading in the region's youngest minds.

Promoting equality from the very beginning of parenthood, United Way Glenelg supported the rollout of Baby Makes 3 in the Glenelg Shire in 2024.

This evidence-based initiative, delivered in partnership with Portland District Health, supports new parents by challenging traditional gender roles and encouraging shared parenting responsibilities.

Launched during the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, the program strengthens family relationships and equips local health professionals to embed gender equality into perinatal care-reflecting United Way Glenelg's commitment to long-term cultural and social change.

## Education cont.

#### Hands Up Casterton Launches Road Safety Simulation Program

A new road safety initiative for young drivers, with the launch of the myDriveSchool simulation program was introduced at Youth HQ.

This program features a state-of-the-art driving simulator designed to teach driving in a safe, controlled environment. Available to young people aged 15-25 and aims to improve driving skills, reduce anxiety, and enhance competence.

Early results show a 48% improvement in driving abilities. The program comes at a crucial time, as young drivers account for 25% of all road deaths nationally.













## Heywood Men's Shed at SharkPitch 2024

During SharkPitch 2024, the Heywood Men's Shed pitched for funding to extend its storage capacity and improve its multi-purpose room.

Volunteer Warren Finck shared the Shed's impact as a supportive community hub, where people facing life's challenges, like Bill—who found comfort and purpose after the loss of his wife—could connect and find solace.

The extension would provide more space for programs, further supporting the mental health and social connection of those in need. The initiative was awarded \$11,050 to help enhance the Shed's capacity to serve the local community.

## Bridging Generations at Heywood Rural Health and Elsa MacLeod Kindergarten

The Magic of Storytime is a cherished event held throughout the year at calibration days such as Mother's Day, Christmas, Halloween, and Pyjama Day.

These themed storytime sessions bring together the children of Elsa MacLeod Kindergarten and the residents of Heywood Rural Health to share the joy of storytelling and foster meaningful connections across generations.

Each event is an opportunity for the young children to engage with their community by reading stories aloud, while the seniors enjoy the lively atmosphere and the warmth of the children's voices.

These occasions not only promote literacy but also strengthen community bonds and create lasting memories for all involved.

The ongoing success of Magic of Storytime highlights the importance of celebrating special moments together, bridging the gap between generations, and sharing the timeless joy of a good story.

## Health

For United Way Glenelg, HEALTH means having access to nutritious food, quality care, and the resources needed to live a safe, active, and healthy life.

Family violence rates are a serious concern, with police-reported incidents sitting 74% higher than the Victorian average and the majority of those affected being women.

Harm from alcohol, drugs, tobacco, and vaping is also more common locally, with 16.9% of adults at increased risk of alcohol-related harm and 22% either smoking or vaping—both higher than the state averages.

Physical inactivity and poor nutrition further affect health outcomes, with 66.4% of adults classified as overweight or obese, and only 3.6% meeting recommended fruit and vegetable intake.

Mental health remains a pressing concern, with 20.1% of adults experiencing high or very high psychological distress and 24.9% reporting feelings of loneliness. These figures highlight the urgent need for strong community connections, accessible health support, and initiatives that build a healthier, more resilient.

#### Clear Vision for Brighter Futures

The Merino Digby Lions Club made a significant impact through their eye vision project, which was supported by funding from the 2024 SharkPitch event.

With a passionate pitch delivered by Shirley Menz, the club secured \$20,000 to support their free vision screening program.

This initiative aimed to identify undetected vision issues among children across the Glenelg Shire, acknowledging that one in five children experience vision problems that often go unnoticed.

The program provides early intervention to help children succeed at school and in life, reinforcing the club's commitment to removing barriers to education and wellbeing through accessible community health initiatives.

#### Improving Student Safety Through Sport

Heywood Consolidated School received funding through United Way Glenelg to enhance student safety by installing padded goal post covers on both its full-sized and junior football fields.

This project was initiated in response to concerns raised by staff and families about the potential risk of injury during schoolyard play.

With over 120 students regularly using the outdoor sports areas, the padded covers provide a simple yet effective way to prevent accidents and encourage safe participation in physical activity.

The school has committed to maintaining the equipment and ensuring it is available for broader community use during events or out-of-hours programs.

This practical investment demonstrates the school's ongoing commitment to student wellbeing and injury prevention.

## **Healthy Aging**

For United Way Glenelg, HEALTHY AGING means having access to care, nutrition, safe spaces, and community support that help people stay active, connected, and well as they grow older.

The shire has a higher median age than the rest of Victoria, with many communities—like Casterton—experiencing a sharp rise in residents aged 65 and over.

This aging population is paired with a growing number of people requiring assistance due to disability, long-term health conditions, and limited mobility.

Many older residents are also living on fixed or low incomes, making it harder to afford essentials like housing, food, and healthcare.

Social isolation is another key concern, with a noticeable rise in lone-person households contributing to a sense of disconnection and vulnerability. Together, these factors highlight the need for targeted, age-friendly initiatives that support older adults to stay active, connected, and well-supported in their communities.

## Honouring a Lifetime of Service: Celebrating Community Wisdom

Shining a light on the remarkable contributions of older residents across the Shire Celebrating Community Wisdom, launched during Seniors Month, the project shares the inspiring stories of five individuals—Jan and Ron Colliver, Stan Aitken, Andrew Legg, Wendy Dowling, and Geoff Mitchell—through short films that capture their decades of service, leadership, and volunteerism.

From raising vital funds and mentoring young people to nurturing the arts and leading local projects, these stories honour the wisdom and dedication of our older generation.

By making the films accessible in cafes, online, and at community events, the project also aims to foster intergenerational connection and inspire others to follow in their footsteps.

#### Spreading Warmth in Winter

To help older residents feel cared for during the coldest months, 200 Winter Care Packages were delivered and filled with hand-made quilts, pantry staples, and thoughtful winter essentials.

Supported by local donors, students, and volunteers, this project brought comfort and connection directly to people's homes, reminding them they are not forgotten.

More than just practical support, the care packages offered a sense of warmth, dignity, and joy—creating meaningful moments and emotional uplift for many recipients. One older resident described the package as a surprise birthday gift that brought tears of gratitude, a story that reflects the heart of this community-led effort.

That's why we actively partner with local agencies, schools, churches, community groups, and other non-government organisations to create positive, lasting impact. 



#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

#### **NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for the purposes of complying with the requirements of the Australian Charities & Not-for-profits Commission Act. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 107 *Statement of Cash Flows*, AASB 108 *Accounting Policies*, *Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and AASB 1054 *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

The financial statements comply with all the recognition and measurement requirements in Australian Accounting Standards.

#### a) Rounding

All amounts shown in the Financial Statements are expressed to the nearest dollar.

#### b) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

#### c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

United Way Glenelg Victoria Inc is not currently registered for GST.

#### d) Investments

Investments held are recorded at market value on the balance sheet date.
